

Her first presentation will be at 2:00 PM Saturday and will feature her Minerva Clark series for young readers. I love Minerva Clark's independence and spirit. Here is a 13 year old girl able to make decisions for herself, feel good about who she is, and not be intimidated by the "cool crowd". The books are set in Portland Oregon, so they go places that are familiar. Minerva Clark Gets a Clue is the first book in the series. Minerva starts out as an average teenager, worried about fitting in, being accepted by her peers. Her day goes seriously awry, her cousin is arrested and she is struck by lightning. Something weird happens, Minerva is no longer worried about being part of the popular crowd, and all of a sudden she is comfortable in her skin. With her new self confidence and her trusty ferret she solves the crime. Minerva Clark Goes to the Dogs finds Minerva spending her summer vacation solving a crime involving the theft of a diamond. Her investigation takes her to the Humane Society and all over town. Minerva Clark Gives Up the Ghost has the intrepid young sleuth solving an arson.



There is a possibility of critters showing up in the presentation, we will have to wait and see. At 5:00 PM Karen Karbo gives a presentation on her latest book, *The Gospel According to Coco Chanel*. Coco was a legend in her own time; she remains a huge influence on the fashion world. A movie will release soon on the life of this fashion icon. 


The Best Books of 2009!

Top Ten Non Fiction

- 1. **The Most They Ever Had** by Rick Bragg. The fate of an Alabama mill town illustrates the real heroes of America, back when we were a nation that created and built, before we became a nation of financiers who sold the ponzi schemes dreamed up by the bad boys of Wall Street. Rick Bragg holds the Pulitzer Prize for reporting.
- 2. **The Big Burn** by Timothy Egan. The biggest forest fire in US history, over 3 million acres burned, is so vividly told the flames crackle and leap from the pages! Teddy Roosevelt and Gifford Pinchot fought to preserve the forests.
- Timothy Egan holds the Pulitzer Prize for reporting and The National Book Award for *The Worst Hard Times*.

 3. *Zeitoun* by Dave Eggers. A family man with a respectable business and long term connections to the community stays behind to ride out Hurricane Katrina in his home. In the aftermath he helps many of his neighbors and stranded strangers only to be arrested. His crime? His Middle Eastern heritage and religion. Folks we should worry when our civil liberties are so easily abandoned.
 - 4. **Strength in What Remains** by Tracy Kidder. Escaping genocide in Burundi and Rwanda, a young man rises from being a refugee in New York to graduating from medical school. Tracy Kidder holds the Pulitzer Prize.
- 5. **The Far Corner** by John Daniel. Essays about life in the Pacific Northwest show his sense of awe and respect for the glory of our natural environment. John Daniel has the PNBA award for **The Rogue River Journal**.
- 6. **Eating Animals** by Jonathan Safran Foer. The birth of his first child inspired Foer to investigate the choice to eat meat, which would be healthier eating meat or not?
- 7. **Enough** by John Bogle. Years of chasing excess, scheming to achieve unsustainable yields, and vastly overextending has left the country saddled with huge tax bailouts. Perhaps more reasonable strategies and a return to earlier values (see #1 above) are in order. Bogle is the creator of the Vanguard Fund.
- 8. **Horse Soldiers** by Doug Stanton. Whether you were opposed to or in favor of the wars in in Iraq or Afghanistan, we should all respect the sacrifices made by our troops. **Horse Soldiers** is the remarkable story of the special forces dropped into Afghanistan to ride with the War Lords battling the Taliban.
 - 9. Outliers by Malcolm Gladwell. A new take on success, what makes a superstar from Bill Gates to Mozart?
 - The Lost City of Z by David Grann. A rousing good tale about the ill fated 1925 Amazon expedition of Percy Fawcett.
- 11. **Cheap** by Ellen Ruppel Shell. There are some substantial hidden costs to America's obsession with the discount culture. Buy from a local shop, the dollars stay in the local economy. The shop uses local printers, painters, accountants, etc, all mid level jobs. Big discount stores bring minimum wages and little benefit to the local economy.

- The Weight of Heaven by Thrity Umrigar. Frank and Ellie had a great life, with a beautiful home, jobs they enjoyed, and a son they adored. Then he was gone. Consumed by grief, Ellie encourages Frank to accept a position in India, thinking they can make a new start. She is energized by India, Frank is overwhelmed. His one joy is the son of their Indian servants. It is dangerous to covet the child of another.
- The Four Corners of the Sky by Michael Malone. A rousing good tale about a Naval Aviator's efforts to track down her erstwhile father. Sunken treasure, gangsters, the FBI, and all sorts of harrowing obstacles challenge her
- Lacuna by Barbara Kingsolver. Young Harrison Shepherd finds work in the home of painters Diego Rivera and 3. Freda Kahlo where he meets Leon Trotsky. Historical fiction at its best!
- South of Broad by Pat Conroy. Read the first sumptuous page and you will be hooked on Conroy's sensuous beautiful prose. Four friends from high school reunite as adults.
- 5. The Museum of Innocence by Orhan Pamuk. Wouldn't it be wonderful if we recognized the moment we were happiest in life as it happens, so we could clutch the happiness close and never let it go? Pamuk's character is alas too human, he lets his happiness slip away and spends his life building a personal museum.
- The Angel's Game by Carlos Ruiz Zafon. A mysterious stranger makes a tempting offer to an author, he wants a particular book written and is willing to be generous. Full of dark alleys, evil secrets, and gorgeous writing.
- You or Someone Like You by Chandler Burr. Howard leaves his gentile wife, Anne, after decades of a happy marriage to reconnect with his Jewish roots. Anne's only way of communicating with Howard is through her weekly book club meetings.
- Into the Beautiful North by Louis Alberto Urrea. Inspired by The Magnificent Seven, girls from a Mexican Village go Into the Beautiful North to bring back the men who have fled their country.
- That Old Cape Magic by Richard Russo. Griffen isn't sure he is living the life he wanted or the life his wife chose or if he has just become another version of his parents.
- 10. Last Night in Twisted River by John Irving. A young boy makes a horrible mistake, a woman is dead, an unscrupulous, homicidal cowboy sheriff is in hot pursuit as the boy and his father spend their lives running.
- 11. Baking Cakes in Kigali by Gaile Parkin. Everyone in Rawanda knows you need to have one of Angel's cakes to have a successful party. As her customers describe the cake of their dreams, they tell Angel their secrets.

In Fiction and Non Fiction there were so many wonderful books I could not keep the list to ten, I just had to add 11 as an honorable mention. In Mystery we used books that released either in hardback or paperback in 2009.

Top Ten Mystery


- 1. The Dark Horse by Craig Johnson. Hang onto your hats! Dark Horse will take you for the ride of your life, fast enough to shoot up flames!
- The Girl Who Played With Fire and The Girl With The Dragon Tattoo by Steig Larsson. A reporter and a reclusive but brilliant hacker solve crimes in this complex, original, compelling series.
- Finding Nouf by Zoe Ferraris. A woman goes missing in the desert, her death poses uncomfortable questions. Set in Saudi Arabia, it takes you behind the chador without denigrating the culture and tells a good story too.
- 4. The Last Dickens by Matthew Pearl. Dickens died with his last book half finished. The publishing industry gets deadly as the missing chapters are hunted.
- The Sweetness at the Bottom of the Pie by Alan Bradley. A lively mystery set in an English Village.
- The Brass Verdict by Michael Connelly. Tightly plotted, timely and engrossing. Connelly rocks!
- A Grave in Gaza by Matt Beynon Rees. Dark and complex, Rees draws on his days as a reporter for this series set in Palestine.
- A Beautiful Place to Die by Malla Nunn. During apartheid in South Africa when a police captain is murdered it is far more convenient to round up a likely black man than to seek the uncomfortable truth.
- The Private Patient by P.D. James. Dalgliesh must find out why a prominent reporter was murdered.
- 10. Dog on It By Spencer Quinn. This detective has the nose to follow any trail, now if he could only stop being distracted by rabbits.



Deceptively simple, this powerful story follows the life of a poor rural farmer. He suffers famine, poverty and eventual wealth, but always it is the land that brings him back to his roots. Poignant and filled with rich human drama, the story paints a vivid picture of life in a small rural Chinese Village and the suffering possible when fate is uncontrolled. Pearl Buck was the first American woman to win the Nobel Prize for literature.






