

The guilt pictured was created by Judy Johnson of the Mountain Meadows Quilters.





Farrell Covington and the Limits of Style by Paul Rudnick. Farrell Covington is a golden boy, astonishingly handsome, ridiculously wealthy, the son of a powerful family. He is also friendly and kind. Just try to resist all of that! Nate Reminger, a shy Jewish boy, doesn't even try, he succumbs to Farrell's considerable charms feeling amazed to be chosen by such a man. They meet in the library at Yale when both are college students and start a romance that will last lifelong.

From 1970's to current day, they face the AIDS epidemic, the changing attitudes toward being gay, the pressures of family, and the tumultuous political landscape of the US. From Manhattan to LA to Rome, their romance spans continents and decades.

If you want to spend some time with truly nice, clever people, hang out for a while with Farrell and Nate, they will amuse you and make you feel good too!

Crow Mary by Kathleen Grissom. Based on the life of Crow Mary and following the historic record closely, this is the story of a woman who dared to believe in standing up for what was right at a time when justice was in short supply for Native Americans.

She grew up the daughter of a Chief, taught by her grandfather to ride and shoot as well as a boy. She expected to live her life within her tribe, to marry a brave and valiant warrior. But events intervene and Crow Mary lived a different life.

In 1872 the teenage Crow Mary weds Abe Farwell, a white fur trader with a trading post in Saskatchewan Canada and dreams of owning a ranch. When a gang of drunken trappers kill 40 Nakoda and take 5 of the women to repeatedly savage, it is Crow Mary who takes her guns and goes after the kidnapped women. This is a woman time should not forget! She leads a remarkable life, and Grissom tells it with empathy and respect.


A Disappearance in Fiji by Nilima Rao is the first in a new series.

Akal Singh was a rising star in the Hong Kong Police until something went wrong, and instead of being on the cusp of a brilliant career he was packed off to the backwater of Fiji where the Inspector General wasn't at all keen on taking in Hong Kong's castoff. Nonetheless here he is, his prospects uncertain, doing his best.

Fiji uses indentured Indians to work on the plantations, no one has paid them much attention, not even the official in charge of immigration. The Plantation owners have pretty much had their own way. Things might be changing. A delegation is coming to check on the indentured servants, plans are made to have dinners and such, for everything to go smoothly on the visit, then back to normal, or what passes for normal.


That is, until an Indian woman goes missing and the local Priest is upset, loudly upset. He contacted the police, and not being overly encouraged with their attitude, has printed a piece in the newspaper about the missing woman and his fear she is kidnapped. The Inspector General assigns the case to Akal, with the instructions to just make it go away, go talk to people, politely, don't ruffle any feathers and keep things calm. Of course, that is not going to be how things progress with Akal on the case!

Independence Square by Martin Cruz Smith. Years ago Arkady Renko busted on the scene in Gorky Park, Parkinson's disease has slowed him a bit, but experience still counts. When mobster Fyodor Abakov's daughter Karina goes missing, it is Renko he trusts to find her. Renko's corrupt boss, Prosecutor Zurin, has sidelined him with a desk job, an assignment he loathes. So he agrees to search for the mobster's daughter.

He soon discovers the girl was swimming in dangerous waters, she was criticizing Putin, a world leader uncommonly sensitive to any sort of criticism, and getting more so by the day. There is trouble in the air, in a few short months Russia will invade Ukraine. Elena, Karina's Ukrainian roommate, is also worried about her. The trail leads them to Kyiv and Crimea, where their lives will be in danger and escape uncertain.



Little Monsters by Adrienne Brodeur. Adam Gardner a brilliant man, an oceanographer, realizing he is nearing the end of his career and is desperate for one more major discovery. He is fast approaching 70 and in order to clear his mind, he has stopped taking the medication that kept his bipolar disease in check.

He raised his two children, Abby and Ken, who are each anticipating giving him a special gift on his birthday, although the gifts will be vastly different. Ken is all about the money, and not a terribly nice guy, he is a successful business man who places value firmly on the all-mighty dollar. Abby is an artist, somewhat under Ken's thumb, as he owns the studio she calls home. Into this volatile mix there is a new person, Steph, who has a reason for being around the Gardner's, a secret she may or may not reveal. But then they all have secrets.

This is a lovely book about family populated with interesting characters, and exploring the ways we grow old, solve our ambitions, and connect with each other.




Banyan Moon by Thao Thai. Three generations of women are connected to each other and to an old Florida home sheltered by a giant banyan tree. Ann was always closer to her grandmother, Minh, than her mother, Huong, a situation her mother resents. Ann moved away and built a successful life, with a lovely home and handsome boyfriend.

However, the surface is rarely the whole story, it is what lurks beneath that may count. And in Ann's case, she is about to face some life changing occurrences. First off, she is pregnant, and it is not a planned pregnancy. Then the call comes, informing her that her beloved grandmother has died. It has been a long time since she has seen her grandmother, and now she is gone. Minh left a legacy to her daughter and granddaughter, the gothic old house with the banyan tree. In it Ann will find long buried secrets as she learns more about her grandmother who left war torn Vietnam to immigrate to Florida.

Of course, there is a lot more to the story! This is one of those books you will treasure reading.





COMMUTING CLARE POOLEY **The Many Daughters of Afong Moy** by Jamie Ford. Fiction and history combine, focusing on traumas of one generation impacting the next, down through generations. This ambitious novel, so beautifully written it is hard to put down, ranges from the 1830's to 2086.

The story is anchored by Dorothy in 2045 Seattle, a time when rising sea levels and phenomenal storms make life in the Emerald City far from easy. Dorothy was a teacher and talented poet, honored as Washington's poet laureate, but her career has stalled. Currently between gigs, her home life is not working either. Annabel, her 5-year-old daughter, is the only bright spot left from her relationship with Louis. Dorothy is troubled by dream states that seem like reality, experiencing lives of her ancestors, in other decades or even centuries. They all seems so real to her; the pain of her ancestors leaves her depressed and unable to function. Then Annabel starts to share the dreams, Dorothy is desperate to find some way to cope, to address

the past in a meaningful way. In Seattle a doctor has developed an experimental treatment that allows Dorothy to fully engage with the traumas of her forebearers and ultimately confront the past.

Thus, we step into history, perceived through the experiences of women who faced much hardship. Through Dorothy's attempt to free herself from the trauma of the past, the reader is guided to pivotal points in history and given an intimate view of the experiences shared by women in those times. Grand book, great writing, and a plot that will keep you thinking long after the last page.

IONA Iverson's Rules for Commuting by Clare Pooley. Every weekday lona commutes on the same train to her job writing an advice column for a magazine. She always sits in the same space, placing her small dog on the adjacent seat. Or course many of the people are familiar, as they also usually ride the same train too. But no one speaks, they sit quietly in their own little worlds, cloaked in anonymity. As is the proper way to commute.

Until one day the successful looking bloke, in the expensive looking suit, chokes on a grape. The pretty young woman sitting in the next chair ineffectually pats his back. Iona whaps it harder, while calling for medical assistance. A fit looking young man turns out to be a nurse, he steps in and saves the day.

This one moment of potential tragedy breaks a barrier, lowers their shields of anonymity. Nothing is the same, connections are forged. From then on, when they see each other on the train, they are no longer just strangers, their names are known, they have shared a life-or-death moment. Their identities and worries will be known too. And soon, something wonderful happens as, overseen by lona, they become a group of people who care. Funny, charming, and heartwarming.

Dr. Wendy Merideth of Sunriver Veterinary Clinic 541-593-8128 alerted us to the danger of mushrooms. Every year dogs ingest poisonous mushrooms, sometimes fatally, always requiring prompt medical attention. In the Deschutes National Forest be cautious of leg hold traps that can grievously injure a pet, or a person.
